Pastor's Note

Dear Assumption Parishioners,

We have returned to the public celebration of Mass! Praise God!

Though it caught us completely by surprise, we were delighted last week when Governor Inslee announced that Phase 1 counties could hold outdoor religious services with up to 100 people, while Phase 2 counties could hold indoor religious services with up to 50 people. Much credit needs to be given to our Washington State bishops for all of their behind-the-scenes activism, alternately collaborating with, and then keeping the pressure on, the governor's office. Had it not been for our bishops, religious services would not have been given these additional accommodations in the early phases and we might still be stuck with unhelpful drive-in services.

Much credit also goes to our parish staff for the fact that we have been able to hold a public Mass already. Assumption was only one of a handful of parishes in the entire archdiocese offering Masses last weekend, and that is because our staff were so motivated, connected, and on top of things that we managed to submit a full plan of action to the archdiocese by Thursday evening. And we have only been able to retain such a competent parish staff because you, our parishioners, continue to support your parish generously, even amid economic uncertainties.

This is, unfortunately, a longer letter than usual. The complexities of beginning to open the parish again require a lot of space, and some important announcements have come up that we felt could not wait. Thank you for wading through the entire thing!

May the Lord, who has never abandoned his people, continue to guide each of us in this crazy time!

How to Attend Mass

Capacity is limited, so **everyone who attends Mass must first register**. That registration will look different this weekend than it will in future weekends.

Weekend of June 06/07

For the weekend of June 06/07, we will continue to hold Mass outdoors and we will continue to use the Sign-Up Genius system that we used last weekend.

Unfortunately, this is a first-come, first-served system, **so if you were able to attend Mass last weekend, would you consider waiting until** Friday afternoon to sign up again? That will allow people who were not able to attend last weekend to maybe attend this weekend.

Future Weekends

For future weekends, we will be <u>assigning</u> people to Masses. With our limited capacity, it is possible that each family will only be able to attend Sunday Mass *every other or every third weekend*. Those who are not able to attend a Sunday Mass in a given weekend will be given priority for the daily Masses that week (once daily Masses begin again).

So how does this system work?

- 1. <u>Take this survey to tell us that you are ready to attend Sunday Masses.</u> Please fill this out even if you are planning to serve as a liturgical minister. We need to know *everyone* who is ready to return to Sunday Mass.
- 2. Wait for an e-mail each week (likely sent Wednesday or Thursday) with a list of who can attend which Masses that weekend.

Two important notes:

- 1. You only need to sign up once! Once you are in our system, you will automatically be assigned to Masses going forward. Please also sign up as a family, not as individuals.
- 2. **If you are not yet ready to attend Sunday Mass** (especially an indoor Mass), *do not sign up yet!* The link will be on our website and you can fill out the survey when you are ready.

Important Questions

"What if I am not yet comfortable coming to Mass?"

That is totally okay! We are all still dispensed from our Sunday obligation, and as long as that dispensation continues, no one should feel guilty for not coming to Mass in person. We are all going to reengage with society, including the Church, at our own pace *and that is okay*.

"Will you still be streaming Mass?"

Yes. We will stream the Sunday Mass for as long as the Archbishop dispenses us from our Sunday obligation. We want people to pray along with the Sunday Mass, even if they are not required to be there in person. Once the dispensation is lifted, we will stop streaming Sunday Mass. We will stop streaming daily Mass sometime before that, but we have no idea when that might be.

"Is Fr. Moore still doing communion visits?"

Yes, Fr. Moore will continue to do communion visits (in neighborhoods and on campus) for as long as there is a significant population of people who are not yet comfortable returning to Sunday Mass. However, it is always better to receive communion as part of Mass than to receive it outside of Mass, so Fr. Moore is asking those who are able to attend Sunday Mass to no longer receive communion outside of Mass.

"Can my friend bring me a host?"

No. Except for very rare, case-by-case circumstances, Fr. Moore is the only one distributing communion during Phase 1 and Phase 2. This is because the Archdiocese is very strict about the sterilization and hygiene requirements for distributing communion at the moment and Fr. Moore is ultimately responsible if someone gets sick because of the distribution of communion associated with the parish.

Technology Ambassadors

We know that we have many parishioners who struggle with technology or do not have access to e-mail. Some of these folks would very much like to attend Mass or receive communion, but we do not have the capacity in the office to call each of these parishioners every time new Mass assignments are out.

However, if each of our more technologically savvy parishioners adopted one phone-only parishioner, the work of making sure that all of our parishioners are taken care of gets spread out and suddenly becomes manageable.

Do you know someone who struggles with technology? Would you consider becoming their "Technology Ambassador"? That would involve (1) calling that person, (2) filling them in on our parish happenings, (3) signing that person up to attend Mass or receive communion, and (4) call them to inform them each time they receive a Mass assignment or a communion visit.

Are you already doing this for multiple people? Consider sending <u>Dr. Kathy Ernst</u> some of those names so that she can assign them to a different Technology Ambassador.

Don't know anyone who needs help? Consider volunteering yourself to <u>Dr. Kathy Ernst</u> to be a Technology Ambassador.
